Convictions Game

Supplies needed: Photocopy onto card stock pages 2 and 3 for each child. You'll also need scissors.

Instructions: Have children cut out the 15 game pieces and put their names on the top of the game board. This is a matching game that helps children consider thinking errors and their corresponding convictions to keep them on track. Bible verses are also provided to help children think about God's wisdom.

Have children work independently first to try to match up the pieces accordingly. After about five minutes if there are unfinished pieces they can work as a group to help each other finish the puzzles.

Note: The order of the rows may differ from child to child. The important thing is that they are correctly matched up in each row.
















Discussion points: Heroes have the ability to look past what others normally think and develop convictions that help them do the right thing. The best convictions come from the Bible. In this matching game you're trying to figure out some of the corresponding convictions that will help overcome thinking errors.

To further this exercise you might ask the children, "Can anyone give me an illustration or story of one of the convictions?"
